Regardless of industry, you can expect to gain a number of transferable skills while working as an apprentice, such as time management and communication.

Earn 45 college credits for completing a five-year apprenticeship. <u>Earning potential</u>: The average salary upon completion is \$72,000 per year, apprentices earn about \$300,000 more in their careers than non-apprenticeship employees. <u>Employment opportunities</u>: Jobs that are high growth and in demand.
